

Juneteenth @160

In 2025, the Center for African American Military History (CAAMH), which operates the Buffalo Soldiers National Museum (BSNM), will celebrate the 160th Anniversary of Juneteenth with a three-day celebration (June 19-21) centered on community engagement, empowerment, and education. The celebration will include exhibits, panel discussions, artistic installations, and interpretations related to the Emancipation Proclamation complemented by a living history encampment.



PURPOSE & GOALS

Juneteenth@160 is a unique opportunity for all communities to gather, celebrate, and learn. BSNM has a special focus on youth, educators, history enthusiasts, and lifelong learners so that we, the people, develop a more meaningful understanding of the historical context of Juneteenth. The Emancipation Proclamation's essence was to free all formerly enslaved African Americans; however, in Texas, news and freedom arrived late. Juneteenth was the catalyst to emancipation for all African Americans, including those in Texas. The 13th, 14th, and 15th amendments cemented the road to citizenship.

Since the late 19th Century and to the present, Juneteenth has been a time of celebration, reflection, and empowerment in the African American community, which has evolved into the Federal Holiday that it is today. Through the 19th and 20th Centuries, Juneteenth has been revered throughout the African American community as well as other communities far and wide in the United States. In 2021, with the leadership of the Late Honorable Sheila Jackson Lee, Juneteenth became the 11th Federal Holiday. While we, the American community, embrace and support the nationwide observances, we are also mindful to shine a light on the rich, as well as ghastly, history of Juneteenth, its impact on African Americans and all Americans, and the unique roles of Texas, the United States Colored Troops (U.S.C.T.) and the Buffalo Soldiers.

The event will anchor Juneteenth in its historical context and center the Emancipation Proclamation as a moment in time and as the start of a reckoning toward the true creed of liberty and justice for all, which remains in process.

Terms & Conditions: The Promise vs. Reality

The United States Colored Troops (U.S.C.T.) fought for a freedom that was proclaimed but persistently withheld. Their service was a revolutionary act of self-definition, a radical claim to personhood, dignity, and citizenship, even as systems around them denied those promises. This exhibition reflects on the legacy and parallels of the U.S.C.T. and asks what freedom has looked like for Black Americans post 1865 through the current sociopolitical and cultural climate when it has so often come with conditions.

Terms & Conditions: The Promise vs. Reality invites audiences to explore the evolution of emancipation and Black liberation through historical context and Black imagination. Contemporary artists interrogate what freedom has meant to the U.S.C.T. and Black Americans across time and within systems of anti-Blackness. Interpretive panels and QR codes guide visitors through pivotal historical moments, from the myth of the Emancipation Proclamation to the loopholes of the Reconstruction Amendments.

The exhibition reveals how freedom in the U.S. has often been defined by exclusions rather than access. In response, Black communities have cultivated cultural practices that serve as tools for survival and liberation.

Curated by Seba R. Suber, with historical interpretation by Cale Carter II, Jason Fung, and Dr. Michelle Tovar of the Buffalo Soldier National Museum.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Gen. Barrye L. Price (Ret.) Ph.D.

President and CEO Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA)

Major General (Retired) Barrye L. Price is a 1985 Distinguished Military Graduate of the University of Houston's College of Business Administration. He earned a Master of Arts degree in History in 1994 from Texas A&M University, and in 1997 he became the first African American to obtain a doctorate from the Department of History in the 147-year history of Texas A&M University. He also earned a Master of Science degree in National Security Strategy from the National Defense University in 2004.

Major General Price served on the President and First Lady's Task Force on "Raising Responsible and Resourceful Teenagers" in 2000; served on President Clinton's "Mississippi Delta Task Force," which sought to revitalize the 207-county, sevenstate region that comprises the Mississippi River flood plain from 1999 through 2000. He is the author of the 2001 volume Against All Enemies Foreign and Domestic: A Study of Urban Unrest and Federal Intervention Within the United States. He is also the author of the 2020 volume Homeland Defense: Civil Unrest and Federal Intervention Within the United States of America. In 2023, Major General Price wrote a screenplay and directed a movie titled Interview with a King.

Major General Price assumed his duties at CADCA as the Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer on October 1, 2016. He became the President and CEO of CADCA on September 1, 2020.

Dr. María Esther Hammack

Dr. María Esther Hammack is a Mexican scholar with Ph.D. in American History from the University of Texas at Austin whose work bridges the histories of liberation and abolition across the U.S., Mexico, and Canada. Her book, Channels of Liberation, reimagines the Underground Railroad by centering Black Americans who sought freedom in Mexico.



Darron Charles "DC" Overby

Darron Charles Overby is a U.S. Army Reserve veteran, police officer, and living historian based in Arlington, VA. With 19 years of military service, including Operation Spartan Shield, he began reenacting at age 11. He volunteers at the African American Civil War Memorial & Museum and the Smithsonian NMAAHC. Specializing in African American military history from the Revolution through the Civil War.

Director of Exhibitions at the Buffalo Soldiers National Museum

Cale Carter II earned a BA in History from Huston-Tillotson University and was a Research Fellow in the Mellon-Mays Undergraduate Fellowship. Carter has worked as a Living Historian with the Texas State Parks and Wildlife Buffalo Soldiers Heritage and Outreach Program, a Research Intern for ColumbiaSC63, and Curator of Exhibits for the South Carolina Military Museum.

Dr. Olenda Johnson

Dr. Olenda E. Johnson is a native of Cheyenne, Wyoming – home of the 9th and 10th Cavalry Buffalo Soldiers Regiments, Fort D.A. Russell. Dr. Johnson is a noted pioneer within professional military education. She is the first Black Woman to serve on the faculty at the Army War College, the first appointed to the faculty at the Naval War College, and the first to achieve the rank of full professor. Olenda earned her Ph.D. in Organizational Behavior from the University of Pittsburgh, and both a B. S. and MBA from Florida A&M University. Prior to joining the Naval War College, Dr. Johnson was a tenured professor at North Carolina A&T State University. She previously served as the Distinguished Visiting Professor at the U.S. Air Force Academy and held adjunct faculty appointments at the Wellington School of Business and Government in New Zealand and Bentley University.


